



AVID Strategy of the Month



HIGHER LEVEL THINKING

WHO:

Students receive instruction on asking higher-level questions using Costa's Levels of Thinking during tutorials, collaborative study groups, class discussions, and problem-solving activities.

WHY:

- Inquiry is about thinking: thinking that is revealed in questioning, analyzing, and constructing knowledge and understanding.
- Inquiry puts students at the center of an active learning process in which the teacher is the facilitator of learning. Inquiry engages students with their own thinking processes (i.e., metacognition). It teaches them to think for themselves instead of chasing the "right answer."



APPLICATION:

To better understand the content being presented in their core subject areas, it is essential for students to learn to think critically and to ask higher levels of questions. By asking higher levels of questions, students deepen their knowledge and create connections to the material being presented. Students need to be familiar with Costa's (and/or Bloom's) Levels of Thinking to assist them in formulating higher levels of questions.

Cyberbullying

Keeping our students safe, secure, and supported is one of our top priorities. As a result, one of our commitments is to create a school where bullying is not acceptable. Over the last week, it has come to our attention that some of our fifth graders have been the victims of online bullying on TikTok. This anonymous bullying is hard on students and can potentially develop a deep emotional scar. We have aggressively worked with our students to investigate and identify the source. The issue has been reported to TikTok and they have responded by shutting down accounts. Our school's mental health professionals are also working with our fifth-grade teachers to support our students. Lessons about cyberbullying and responsible digital citizenship will be taught in each classroom. Staff is also available to speak individually with students as needed. This kind of behavior cannot and will not be tolerated at Scott.

As you also know, bullying behavior occurs off school grounds and outside of school hours. We are asking you to partner with us and help us stop this from happening. Take time and discuss the issue with your child, monitor their online activities and report any act of cyberbullying to TikTok, then report it to school. One of the most effective ways of shutting down this kind of activity is having your child block the creators of these types of accounts. By blocking the accounts we are working together to stop this serious form of bullying. We thank you for your support of our students.


Drug-Free School

Research indicates that exposure to illicit drug use and drug paraphernalia, in the home or in the community, has a detrimental effect on children. Traditionally, drug use has been viewed as a problem affecting adults, with less attention given to the residual harm to children. Scott Elementary School focuses on the children.

Parents, educators, and entire communities must remain aware of the need for positive parenting goals and practices. Many children of drug-addicted parents may have received instructions, such as, "do not pick up needles, syringes or drug-using equipment from the ground." All children need to know that these items are likely contaminated.

We ask that parents devise strategies to protect children from the risks of drugs, drug needles, and other drug paraphernalia. Although it is legal for some drugs to be used with a prescription or when 21 years of age, it is illegal for anyone to bring drugs or drug paraphernalia on campus. Please speak with your children and let them know not to pick up anything that does not belong to them and keep medications, drugs, and paraphernalia out of the reach of your children. Our goal is to keep all students safe at school and ensure a drug-free educational space for our students.






Tolerance and Respectful Language

The usage of racially incentive language, by any and all cultures, is unacceptable and disrespectful to those using and those who happen to hear it, even if it is not directed towards them. As a school, we are teaching students the academic standards as well as societal norms that we all need to build a better community.

Scott Elementary is asking for your help!! Please discuss the usage of language and the effects of words. Any usage of racially incentive language will result in behavior consequences in accordance with CCSD policy.



Scott Book Challenge Library Program

The Scott Book Challenge is back! This program encourages students to read, read, read. Students receive a bookmark and list 10 books that have read completely and without duplicating a book title. When they turn the bookmark into the Library they will receive a prize. After the student has completed 3 bookmarks (30 books), they will complete a book recommendation before receiving another bookmark. All bookmarks are placed into the Grand Prize Drawing, which will be held at the end of the school year. Please support our school reading initiative and encourage your child read everyday for at least 20 minutes.

At the beginning of the year, we challenged our kindergarteners to read 1,000 books by the end of the year. Parents continue to help your students log the books they read on the number chart forms we provided. If you need more sheets, you may request them from your child's teacher at any time. We will be checking in with them and celebrating how close they are getting to completing the challenge when we return.



Traffic and Crosswalk Safety

Please ensure you follow the drop-off and pick-up procedures in the morning and afternoon. These procedures are in place to ensure the safety of our children. It is important that everyone follows the directions of the staff at drop-off and pick-up times. Your children need to use the provided crosswalks. 


